Tips to avoid getting an avalanche of spam

As you probably already know from first hand experience, once you're on a spammer's list, it's next to impossible to get off. And changing your e-mail address can be a major inconvenience especially if you rely on it to stay in touch with important business and personal contacts.

Reduce the chances of your e-mail address becoming flagged as spam. Once your address makes it on a black list, it is very difficult to work around.

These five simple preventative measures that will go a long way in keeping not-so-delicious spam out of your in-box and protecting your email address.

1. Use a disposable e-mail address. If you buy products online or occasionally subscribe to web sites that interest you, chances are you're going to receive spam.

To avoid your main e-mail address from ending up on their broadcast list, set up a free Internet e-mail address with Hotmail, Yahoo or Google and use it when buying or opting in for online newsletters or promotions.

7 tips for working securely from wireless hotspots

Wireless hotspots are changing the way people work. These wireless local area networks (WLANs) provide high speed Internet access in public locations—as well as at home—and require nothing more than a notebook PC with a wireless card.

From coffee shops to restaurants, airports to hotel lobbies, hotspots are ubiquitous. They are the de facto connection method for travelers and remote workers to access the Internet, their e-mail, and even their corporate networks.

2. Pay attention to check boxes.

Whenever you subscribe to a web site or make a purchase online, be very watchful of small, pre-checked boxes that say, "Yes! I want to receive offers from third party companies."

If you do not un-check the box to opt-out, your e-mail address can (and will) be sold to every online advertiser willing to pay for a list. To avoid this from happening, simply take a closer look at every online form you fill out even if you use an auto-fill program.

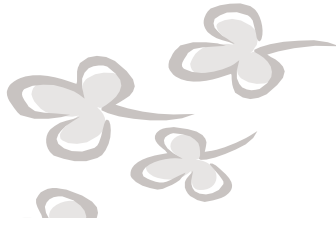
3. Don't use your main e-mail address on your web site, web forums, or newsgroups. Spammers have special programs that can glean e-mail addresses from web sites without your permission. If you are posting to a web forum or newsgroup, use your disposable e-mail address instead of your business or personal e-mail address.

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mon: These are all open networks that are vulnerable to security breaches. And that means it's up to you to protect the data on your PC. Here are a few tips to make working in public locations more secure.

1. Try to choose more secure connections. It's not always possible to choose your connection type—but when you can, opt for wireless networks that require a network security key or have some other form of security, such as a certificate. The information sent over these networks is encrypted, which can help protect your computer from unauthorized access. The security

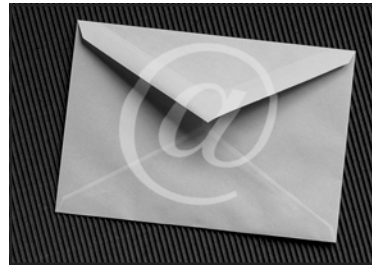

Tips to avoid an avalanche...

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If you want to post an e-mail address on your home page, use "info@" and have all replies forwarded to a folder in your in-box that won't interfere with your primary address.



If business123@success.com shows up as the original recipient, you know the source since that e-mail address was unique to that web site. Now you can easily stop the spam by making any e-mail sent to that address bounce back to the sender.

4. Create throw away e-mail accounts to avoid clutter. If you own a web domain, all mail going to an address at your domain is probably set up to come directly to you by default. For example, an e-mail addressed to anything@yourdomain.com will be delivered to your in-box. But don't worry, this is a great way to fight spam without missing out on important e-mails you want to get.

The next time you sign up for a newsletter, use the title of the web site in your e-mail address. For example, if the website is titled "business123.com", enter "business123@success.com" as your e-mail address.

If you get an email that look like it could be spam, look at what address the e-mail was sent to and you can easily decipher the senders intentions.

5. Don't open, reply to or try to opt-out of obvious spam e-mails. Opening, replying to, or even clicking a bogus "opt-out" link in an obvious spam e-mail signals that your e-mail address is active, and more spam will follow.

The only time it is safe to click on the opt-out link or reply to the e-mail is when the message was sent from a company you know or do business with (for example, a company that you purchase from or a newsletter you subscribed to).

features of different networks appear along with the network name as your PC discovers them.

2. Make sure your firewall is activated. A firewall helps protect your mobile PC by preventing unauthorized users from gaining access to your computer through the Internet or a network. It acts as a barrier that checks all incoming information, and then either blocks the information or allows it to come through. Microsoft XP or newer Windows operating systems come with a firewall, just make sure it's turned on.

3. Monitor your access points. Chances are, there are multiple wireless networks anywhere you're trying to connect. These connections are all access points, because they link into the wired system that gives you Internet access. So how do you make sure you're connecting to the right one? Simple—by configuring your PC to let you approve access points before you connect.

Windows Vista takes the guesswork out of connecting to hotspots because you are automatically prompted to approve new connections. In addition, after you approve a connection, you assign it a profile for future use.

4. Disable file and printer sharing: File and printer sharing is a feature that enables other computers on a network to access resources on your computer. When using your mobile PC in a hotspot, it's best to disable file and printer sharing because when enabled, it leaves your computer vulnerable to hackers.

Remember, though, to turn this feature back on when you return to the office.

5. Make your folders private. When the folders on your mobile PC are private, it's more difficult for hackers to access your files.

6. Encrypt your files. You can protect your files further by encrypting them, which requires a password to open or modify them. Because you must perform this procedure on one file at a time, consider password-protecting only the files that you plan to use while working in a public place.

7. Consider completely removing sensitive data from your notebook PC.

If you're working with extremely sensitive data, it might be worth taking it off your notebook PC altogether. Instead, keep it behind the corporate firewall and use your company's VPN to access it when necessary. This way, you have multiple safeguards in place.

Technology spending in 2008 Two factors might make or break the 2008 economy, experts say, and they are old economic friends.

The key factors are consumer spending and strong earnings in big economic sectors like health care, telecommunications, and information technology, according to The Wall Street Journal analysts. Because consumer spending accounts for more than two-thirds of the U.S. economy, any slowdown is cause for worry. At the beginning of 2008 there were lagging sales at companies that provide items that people want but don't actually need. They include expensive dinners, sports tickets and SUVs. The sales lag caused a dip in the stock market, but sales did not totally drop off, as some investors feared.

At the same time, turmoil in the housing and financial sectors led many people to wonder if there would be a recession. But early in the first quarter of 2008, the problem had not spilled over into other sectors. Telecommunications, health care, and information technology all boasted big gains. The Standard & Poor's measure of the operating earnings (down 7.7 percent) would be up about 11 percent if you take off housing and financials.

More online payment options E-tailers are responding to identity theft fears by offering new ways to pay for online purchases.

Google Checkout and PayPal Express Checkout let customers sign up and provide financial details only to them rather than giving credit card numbers to vendors when completing an order.

Another option is Bill Me Later. This payment type sends customers a monthly bill and allows them pay by check through the mail. Verified by Visa and MasterCard Secure

Code lets cardholders create passwords that add additional security to their credit card numbers.

Unfortunately, many small and midsize retailers don't offer these new services yet. However, over the next five years, many companies will adopt these new security features to ensure customers feel at ease shopping at their online stores.
